Must Control Skagit River Says McLean

Stressing the fact that Skagit river is this county's most valuable resource as well as most serious danger, W. A. McLean, chairman of the county planning commission, spoke before the Monday evening meeting of the Burlington Parent-Teaches' association.

Skagit county has an almost perfectly balanced economy, said Mr. McLean, with one-third of its industry in agriculture; onethird forestry; and the remaining third divided among fishing, manufacturing and miscellaneous business.

However, the Skagit river as the principal resource providing county's irrigation, electrical energy, transportation, as well as commercial and sport fishing, deserved the attention of the county planning bodies. With the gradual closing of the south fork opens the possibility of a breakup in the north which would completely flood the valley if the river is not controlled systematically, warned McLean. Now under consideration by the county commission is an emergency flood gate in the Allen-Fredonia district and a main flood control project between Concrete and Sauk.

Mr. McLean also touched briefly on the county's forest resources, bringing out the fact that the Douglas fir is now being cut in excess of growth and that the supply to outside counties can not be continued if the product is not increased.

Skagit county has the basis for a sound and balanced economy, said Mr. McLean in closing, if the spirit of cooperation always shown in the county will continue for its best interests.

Other numbers on the evening's

programs were three accordion and piano duets played by Kenneth and Duane Stowe and 3 vocal solos by June Egglestone of Blanchard.

During the business session the members voted to assume the responsibility for the annual Halloween party for Burlington children with details to be announced later.
