

WOULD RESTRAIN NET FISHERMEN

g State Orders 167 Skagit County
People Into Court on Oc-
tober 14.

Notices of a restraining order and order to show cause, with summons and complaint are being served this week upon 167 fishermen who have been charged with operating in the protected area at the mouth of the Skagit river. The restraining order was obtained in the superior court here Friday and states that the fishermen were violating Order No. 8 made in June 1924 by the State Board of Fisheries. These fishermen are alleged to have used gill or drift nets.

The court order cites the fishermen to appear in the Skagit court Tuesday, October 14, at 9:30 o'clock, to show cause why the restraining order should not continue until the final determination of the action.

The restraining order enjoins the taking of salmon except with hook and line in the following Puget Sound areas:

"All the waters of Puget Sound and the waters of Swinomish Slough, inland or inside the following described lines: Commencing at Shannon Point on Fidalgo Island and projected to Yellow Bluff on Guemes Island. Also commencing at Clark Point on Guemes Island and projected to Viti Rocks light, thence projected to Carter Point on Lummi Island. Also commencing at Point Migley on Lummi Island and projected to Sandy Point on the mainland;

"All the waters of the Puget Sound district inside of a line commencing at the most northwesterly point of Whidby Island at the west entrance to Deception Pass, thence to the most southwesterly point of Deception Island; thence northerly along the west shore line of Deception Island to the most northwesterly point of said Deception Island; thence northerly across Northwest Island to a point on Fidalgo near Sare Head; and a line drawn from the point at Utsalady on Camano Island to Stick Point on Whidby Island;

"Any river or stream flowing into Puget Sound or within a distance of three miles outside the mouth of any river or stream flowing into Puget Sound, measured by the most direct water course."

The complaint is signed by John H. Dunbar, attorney general, and R. G. Sharpe, assistant attorney general.
